Moon Phases



What Is It?

The Moon seems to change shape, but it doesn't.

The sun lights up one side of the Moon. As the Moon circles Earth, your view of the Moon changes. You see different Moon **phases**.

How Does It Start?

The Moon **phases** start with the new Moon. The new Moon looks all dark. A few days later a small **sliver** of Moon appears. The next **phase** looks like a banana. It's called a **crescent** Moon.

What Happens Next?

Next, the Moon looks like half of a circle. This **phase** is a **quarter** Moon. The next **phase** is a **gibbous** Moon. It looks like a circle with a **crescent** cut out.

The Last Phase

Next, you see all of
the sunlit side.

It is a full Moon.

After a full Moon,
you see less and less of
the sunlit side. Then, there is
a new Moon again.

Nature's Pattern

One after another,
all the Moon **phases repeat**.

It takes about one month
from new Moon to new Moon.

The **phases** are one
of nature's **patterns**.

Glossary Terms

pattern - something that happens again and again in the same order

repeat - to say or do something again

crescent - a curved shape similar to that of the Moon when it is just a sliver in the sky

gibbous - more than half but less than fully lit

quarter - one of four equal parts

sliver - a very thin and sometimes pointed piece of something

phase - a stage; the Moon's phases are the shapes that it appears to take over a month.

Goods and Services



Buying Things

People buy things they need and want. They buy food to eat and clothing to wear.

They also **spend** money to have their teeth cleaned and their hair cut.

All of these things are either goods or services.

What Are Goods?

Goods are real things that people can touch and use.

They can be large, like a house or a car. Goods can also be small. Notebooks, bananas, and soap are some small goods.

What Are Services?

A service is work done for other people. A dentist's work fixing teeth is a service.

Washing cars, mowing lawns, and cutting hair are other services.

Producers

Goods and services are sold by **producers**. Farmers sell vegetables they grow.

Mechanics are **producers** when they sell the service of fixing cars. Kids are **producers** when they deliver newspapers or mow lawns.

Consumers

A **consumer** is anyone who buys and uses goods and services. People are **consumers** when they buy food at the grocery store. Kids are **consumers** when they buy tickets to the movies.

Glossary Terms

consumer - a person who buys products and services

mechanic - a person who fixes machines

producer - someone who makes, grows, or provides a good or service

spend - to use money to buy things
