	☐ Today, we will recall that when we generalize, we make a broad statement or rule that applies to several examples. We use infer from the text, using details, in order to recognize a generalization. Complete Generalize, pg. 418. (4.RL.1)
	☐ This week in spelling, we will look at the suffixes -ful, -ly, and -ion. We will understand that when adding -ful, -ly, or -ion to most words, the base word stays the same. Complete Suffixes -ful, -ly, and -ion, pg. 333. (4.L.2)

Monday (4/26): Self-Esteem

Watch the Counseling instructional video (link can be found in the upper left corner of this document).

- Definition of self-esteem
 - Confidence in one's own abilities self-respect
- How does a person get self-esteem?
- Yo-Yo Self Esteem
 - O Self-esteem rises and falls with the ups and downs of life
 - O Yo-yo self-esteem is not consistent
 - It leads to unhappy children who are not sure of themselves
- The three traps that crush self-esteem
 - Comparing ourselves to others
 - O Defining an event as who we are or making the event our identity
 - O Self-talk what we say to ourselves both verbally and through our thoughts
 - 2 categories positive and negative

Wednesday (4/28) Grief

- Definition: Grief is the conflicting feelings caused by a change or an end in a familiar pattern of behavior.
 - O Grief is a matter of the heart, not the head.
 - O Grief is a normal and natural reaction to loss.
- There are many different kinds of losses that we experience that include the following:
 - o death family member, pet or friend
 - o moving
 - o health

- o friends
- o jobs
- o divorce
- o debilitating injury to you or someone important in your life
- o brother or sister going to college
- Loss of safety
- Common reactions to loss are:
 - Numbness
 - Reduced ability to concentrate
 - Changes in eating and sleeping patterns
 - o Emotional highs and lows
- Following a major loss of any kind, children are likely to generate tremendous emotions.
- Children will try to deflect the excess energy in several ways:
 - Acting out
 - o Eating too much or not enough
 - Sleeping too much or not enough
 - Older children may turn to alcohol and drugs
 - Won't be able to concentrate
 - Short tempered
 - Wiggly in school
 - o Talk to the person using "I feel___" statements

Thursday (4/29): Worry

- What is worry?
 - The feeling we have when we think something bad might happen.
 - O A lot of times, worry comes as "what if" thoughts
 - O Nervous, anxious, stressed are other words for worry
- Our worries might show up in our bodies in how we feel physically
 - Our muscles might get tight
 - We might have butterflies in our stomach
 - Our heart might be pounding or going super-fast
 - Our face might feel hot
 - Our breathing might be quick and shallow
 - Our chest may feel heavy
- What Can I do If I Worry?
 - o Realize that I am worried!
 - o Breathe
 - o Tell someone about it
 - Stop and Change My Thoughts
