SOME INFORMATION ABOUT NEW INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL



The Brandon Valley School Board has set December 3rd, 2013 as Election Day asking voters to approve a bond issue for \$5,950,000 to be used for the construction and equipping of a new intermediate school. The proposed building will more appropriately group 5th and 6th grade students into their own building that can be designed to specifically meet the learning needs of these young adolescents. At the same time, the new intermediate school would relieve middle school and elementary schools of one grade level each. The overcrowding at the middle school and in-Brandon elementary schools will be eased buying the district time before another new elementary school will be needed.

The steady enrollment growth in Brandon Valley is a welcome part of our communities' development and with that growth comes the need to keep up with the facilities we need to provide quality learning environments for our students. The school board is only asking for a portion of the cost of the new building to come from the proposed bond. Current estimates are that the cost of the bond issue is approximately \$0.28 per thousand of taxable valuation. The rest of the funds needed to build the proposed intermediate school will come from the Capital Outlay Fund and will not result in any additional property taxes for those monies.





Our seniors did an excellent job of leading a freshman group that outnumbered our seniors twofold. We were continually impressed throughout the fall with the maturity growth that the group displayed.

Nurturing performers was always a high priority for the band as band members learned that achieving of excellence is a process, not an event and that it involves many challenges and standards. This is the beauty of marching band and other co-curricular activities; they provide a culture and a family to which all students can belong. Members began to learn that they could depend on one another in their pursuit of excellence-through responsibility, doing their fair share, and sticking to a common goal. While simultaneously building a stronger base for their adult life, students learned to value people; respect their peers; and to not make judgments on the superficial while simultaneously building

The band had one of its most successful seasons in years earning several awards and accomplishments. The band did not place lower than fifth at any competition, and this year's competitions were often in fields of bands greater than 20, consisting of schools of all sizes from three different states. The band finished the season earning top

honors in its class at the Quad State Field Competition on the campus of the University of South Dakota. The band was also named the Overall Grand Champion for the event, with a score of 94.8. This season proved to be an impressive one thanks primarily to the efforts of the students who marched and the dedicated team of instructors who guided them.

There were several other people that contributed significantly to the positive experience for our students and our audiences. It was a joint effort with many members of our school community. Chad Nelson, Brandon Valley High School art instructor, provided the band with images to represent the earthly structures portrayed musically on the field (Sky, Water, Desert and Mountains).
